About Sanfermines

Every summer over 1 million people gather in Pamplona (Iruña), Spain from July 6th – 14th to witness and partake in the world renowned San Fermín Festival. The 9-day celebration originated as a religious festival to honor Saint Fermín, who is the co-patron of the region of Navarre, where Pamplona is the capital. The festival comprises parades, wood chopping competitions, folk dancing, music, bull fights, and of course, the running of the bulls (encierro). Originally, the fiesta was held on October 10th but has since been changed to July 6th for chances of better weather.

**WELCOME TO THE FIRST STEP OF

Beginning in the 20th century, the running of the bulls has become the most popular part of the festival. This idea dates as far back as the 15th century when the only route to get the bulls from their corral to the bull ring would be through the city streets. Over time people began to run alongside the bulls and as Spanish tradition goes, the bull-run became a bit of a competition. Herders would excite the bulls through the streets to speed up the march. Soon people began to run ahead of the bulls for their own excitement, thus the Running of the Bulls was born. The San Fermín Festival reached heightened popularity outside of Spain in 1926 when Ernest Hemingway published the novel *The Sun Also Rises*. The love tale has been printed continuously in multiple languages, adding to the global popularity of the San Fermín Festival.



CHUPINAZO



At exactly 12:00 noon every July 6th, the square in front of the Town Hall witnesses absolute chaos when the start of the San Fermín Fiesta is marked by a single rocket launch. All morning, crowds pack in like sardines at the Plaza Ayuntamiento. The Mayor and members of the Council step out onto the balconies of the Town Hall to greet the crowds. There is an announcement: "Pamploneses, Pamplonesas, Viva San Fermín! Gora San Fermín!" (people of Pamplona, long live San Fermín!). The crowd responds with cries of "Viva!" and "Gora!" The square erupts as hundreds of bottles of Cava are uncorked and sprayed all over the crowd.

STAFF ADVICE

This is an incredibly intense event. There is a lot of pushing back and forth and it can be quite uncomfortable. For this reason, we will take you close by the square where you can watch the event in a more comfortable balcony setting.

Frequently Asked Questions



What is the San Fermin Festival?

The fiesta of San Fermin ("Sanfermines") is celebrated in Iruña/Pamplona, in the region of Navarre. This region is known around the world for the running of the bulls, where the bulls are led through the streets of the old quarter to the bull ring by runners. However, that's just a portion of the celebration.

The fiestas are celebrated in honor of San Fermin, patron saint of Navarre, although the religious aspect would seem to have taken on a secondary role over the last number of decades. Nowadays, the fiestas are seen as a mass gathering of people from all corners of the world and where the partying, the fun, and the joy of it all are the most outstanding ingredients.



How many people attend the San Fermin Festival?

Each year, the city hosts 1,000,000 participants over the week.

Where is Pamplona?

Pamplona is about 50 miles from the Pyrenees Mountains and the Spanish-French border and around 250 miles north of Madrid.



When does the San Fermin Festival take place?

The dates of the San Fermin festival are the same every year, no matter the day of the week. The festival begins at noon on July 6th and concludes at midnight on July 14th, going into July 15th.

How many times do they do the Running of the Bulls?

The bulls run each morning at 8 AM for 8 days, beginning July 7th.

What's the average age of Bucket List Events clients?

That's a hard question to answer, but most of our clients are between the ages of 20-65. It varies with each group. We've had guests that are 60+ years of age as well as kids with their families and college students. We don't have an age limit; you just have to be ready to have a good time!

How many people book with your company?

We try to schedule 30 people or fewer per activity with the exception of the bull fights and dinner. It is our goal to get to know everyone in our program, and that cannot be accomplished with too large of a group. Our balcony locations vary greatly in size, but we abide by a very strict headcount to ensure everyone has a view.

Why is the opening weekend more expensive?

Regardless of the day of the week the festival begins, the first 24 hours of the San Fermin celebration will be the most attended and boisterous days of the week. Hotel rooms are in higher demand and acquired at higher rates. There is also a one-time event called the Chupinazo, which is an extremely popular event.



What is the drinking age?

18 years old.

Do we have to dress up in the traditional white attire and red accessories?

This is not just for the participants in the run; everyone is wearing this, male and female. The official San Fermin costume is a white shirt, white pants/skirt, a red sash, and a red neckscarf. Please note that this is included in each package booking.

Where can we purchase the attire?

There is a shop on every corner selling the traditional clothing articles.

What made Bucket List Events choose the hotel that is part of each package?

It's been a fine tuned process that we believe is the best of both worlds. Hotels located within the party areas are often congested and sleep is hard to find. Our 4-Star hotel, the Hotel Tres Reyes, is a locally owned property located 10 minutes by foot from the heart of the festivities, yet is far enough away that uninterrupted slumber is obtainable.

When should I buy my train ticket?

Train travel during the festival is extremely busy and we advise you book tickets in advance to ensure a seat. The journey between Madrid and Pamplona is about 4 hours by train or car.

The train journey between Barcelona and Pamplona is about 4.5 hours. You can book your RENFE train tickets 60 days in advance.

Is there really a Running of the Nudes?

Yup! The Running of the Nudes is held on the day before the official opening day of the festival. Traditionally there are a lot of animal rights activists who wear white underwear or thongs, red scarves, and plastic bullhorns as they protest the perceived animal cruelty of San Fermin.

Is it safe?

Yes, it is safe. But just like any travel/festival experience, be aware of your surroundings. Keep money in a safe place (not in your back pocket). Security is very present and visible throughout the festival.

Are there ATMs available?

Yes, there are ATMs available throughout the city. We highly recommend notifying your bank beforehand that you will be travelling abroad.

Is Uber or Lyft available?

As of 2024, rideshare apps are not active in Pamplona. However, there is an influx of cabs during the San Fermin, especially around Old Town where the majority of the festival takes place each July.

What are the bull fights like?

A traditional Spanish bull fight is part of your standard package, but we would like to set the correct expectation. The bulls do die during the fight, and the scene isn't always well received by everyone. These events are deeply rooted in Spanish culture, and the crowd is traditionally boisterous and having a good time.

I don't speak Spanish. Will this be a problem?

Unlikely, but we do have guides that are fluent to help with your planning and navigating through the city, especially ordering food!

What food is served at the San Fermin Festival?

Expect to eat a healthy dose of tapas, paella, and fish.

How is the bathroom situation during the festival?

With the increased population during the festival, the city brings in mobile restrooms that are stationed throughout the city.

What time do the daily festivities end?

This is a tricky question to give an exact answer considering the bars and clubs stay open all night. In regards to actual scheduled activities, the run begins at 8 AM and the night capping public fireworks are at 11 PM. There are concerts beginning at midnight each night on stages set up around the old town.

Other San Fermin Traditions

- **Parade of Giants** – held each morning with huge paper mache figures dancing and swirling in the streets
- **Fire bull** – or what appears to be a man in a steel drum covered in firecrackers, is let loose each evening to entertain young and old
- **Corrida** – (bull fights) are held each evening from 6.30pm in the arena when three Matadors fight two bulls each
- **Firework display** – is put on each evening near the old Citadel at 11.00pm. Over the week, there is a competition for the best production. The show never disappoints.
- **Nightly Concert** - Starting at midnight after the firework show, there is a nightly concert in the Plaza del Castillo.

ALL ABOUT BALCONIES

Witness an international phenomenon from above

Will my hotel room have a balcony spot?

No. This is a common misnomer about the bull run. All of the balconies you see along the course are private apartments and businesses. We work with the property owners to provide your balcony options, and provide an escort from your hotel to the balconies in the morning.

Where are the Bucket List Events balconies located?

We have locations spread out over the entire course, but the majority of our balconies are located along Estafeta Street. We prefer this vantage point because it allows the longest viewing opportunity. Something to keep in mind - since the runners are the same height as the bulls, there are some balconies that afford a very brief view of the run. You will only see the bulls once they are right under you. The higher the balcony, the longer the view.

Does your balcony space fill up?

Yes! We accept only a small and exact number of people to watch from our balcony and share breakfast with us each morning. We want everyone to be able to see the run easily. Therefore, we suggest that you reserve your space as soon as possible

Are these private balconies?

Yes, only Bucket List Events guests will be at our locations.

Am I able to participate in the run after the bulls go past the balcony?

No.

Are we able to go to the Plaza del Toros after the run to see the post run activities?

In order to see what happens after all of the bulls enter the arena, you have to be inside the arena by 7 am.

Can we reserve just balcony spots?

Yes, if any spots are remaining we make them available April 1.

What level are the balconies located?

We have locations on the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th floors. Each level has a limited headcount and clear sightlines.

How do we find your balconies the morning we are scheduled to watch?

We provide a guide from your hotel to escort you to the balcony viewing.

Is breakfast served at the balcony?

Yes, a small Spanish style breakfast is available.

OUR STAFF'S TOP 10 FAVORITE THINGS ABOUT THE SAN FERMIN FESTIVAL



**#1 - THE RUNNING
OF THE BULLS**

Simply put, there isn't anything else like it in the world. Although the run only lasts a matter of minutes, the imagery lasts a lifetime. Thrill seekers from all corners of the world come to this small Spanish town to live out a lifetime accomplishment. You watch with intrigue, fear, excitement, concern - emotions that you probably can't explain because you've never seen anything like this before.

We highly suggest you watch the run from an elevated vantage point.



#2 - CHUPINAZO

The Chupinazo represents the beginning of the San Fermin festival on July 6th. Starting at noon, the Chupinazo is a 24 hour extravaganza, full of debauchery and a wild party scene. A simple internet image search will more than confirm this.

It's impossible not to get caught up in the energy radiating throughout the city on July 6th into the 7th. There is a reason why our opening ceremonies package is the first to fill up each year.



#3 - POBRE DE MI

The Pobre de Mi is overall a calmer scene, but there is still plenty of fun to be had in person.

The event takes place at midnight and is based around a candlelight ceremony and epic fireworks. It's certainly a bittersweet event to be a part of, as the ceremony serves as a unique bookend to the wild 8 days in Pamplona.



**#4 - THE
TRADITIONS**

Whether it is the the constant toast of "Viva San Fermin!" or the four rockets that signify the beginning and end of the run, there are dozens of little quirks about the festival.

There is the Parade of Giants and Big Heads, which is exactly what it sounds like. There is the traditional Basque attire of red and white, while not mandatory, is highly encouraged. There are the sangria fights, the water baths, the running of the nudes - you should be prepared to see some strange stuff throughout your trip. Odds are, you'll see something that you've never seen before and will never see again.

#5 - THE MUSIC

We're confident in proclaiming that anytime during the 192 hours of the San Fermin Festival, there is a group singing or a marching band playing in the streets. Odds are, you probably won't recognize the majority of the traditional Spanish songs, the artists take a lot of pride in their music and sound great. When you think about it, there aren't many American drinking songs that everyone knows. That doesn't apply to Spain, where generations all know the same melodies, and you hear them coming from every corner. Throw in that the bands play all day, every day in the streets throughout the city - it's like you have a soundtrack provided for you as you amble around.



#6 - THE BULL FIGHTS

With each passing run of the bulls, there is a bull fight that evening featuring the exact same bulls that run that morning. From roughly 9 AM to 6 PM, they are rested at the arena, and some put up a better fight than others. We'll be up front here: the bulls do not survive the day and are killed in front of your eyes. Needless-to-say, while the fight isn't for everyone, we find the atmosphere to be just as entertaining. The crowd is an incredible source of chants, cheers, boos, food fights - perfectly coinciding with what is going on in the ring.



#7 - THE FIREWORKS

Each night during the San Fermin Festival, there is a grand scale fireworks show over La Ciudadela. The city doesn't cut corners on this one, and each night offers a new choreography to lessen the repetitiveness. Since Pamplona has very few tall buildings, you can see most of the show from anywhere in old town.



#8 - THE CONCERTS

While music is perpetual during the festival, there are two massive stages featuring live bands every evening. The genre of music is very diverse, but it's incredible how much American influence there is in the music scene - especially Motown. The bands have a big sound (Spain loves their brass) and sound great.

And they are FREE!



#9 - PLAZA DEL CASTILLO

The main social square of the old town, this plaza is host to a plethora of famous bars, restaurants, clubs, and casinos. This area was the main haught of Ernest Hemingway, and every business seems to claim that they were his favorite! This is also the location of one of the stages for the nightly concerts, so this is one of the more popular after hours locations.



#10 - SANGRIA

Whether you choose to drink or not in Pamplona, you are going to come into contact with sangria. It's everywhere, both being consumed and used as a prop in the celebration. By the end of your trip, you will know Don Simon brand Sangria like it was a relative.

PLANNING TO RUN? HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW



Where does the the Running of the Bulls take place?

It goes through four streets of the old part of the city of Pamplona. The four streets are Santo Domingo, Town Hall Square, Mercaderes and Estafeta, and a section called Telefónica before entering into the bullring.

When does the Running of the Bulls take place?

The dates of the San Fermin festival are the same every year, no matter the day of the week. The bull runs begin on July 7th and run through the 14th. After the launching of two rockets at 8:00 am, the bulls charge behind the runners for the distance between the corral and the bullring. The third rocket, fired from the bullring, signals that all the bulls have entered the bullring. A fourth and final rocket indicates that all the bulls are safely in the corral located inside the bullring, and that the bull run has ended.

Does everyone have to participate in the Running of the bulls?

Absolutely not. In the Summer of 2023, less than half of our guests participated in the actual run, ages ranging from 18 to 65 years old.

Can women participate in the run?

Yes. The women on our staff, as well as some of our younger guests have completed the run with understanding of the assumed risks.

I plan to participate in the run. What do I need to do to prepare?

We strongly advise you to watch at least one run before taking part in the run. Each package comes with a day on our viewing balcony, located on the longest stretch of the run. We are confident that by watching the run, you will gain an understanding about how the event progresses. Our staff will also be able to walk the route with you, giving you a blueprint of the route and traditionally difficult areas.

Is the bull run safe?

No, it's not, but there are ways you can make it a little safer. To ease your mind, there are drastic measures taken by the city to prepare for the inevitable injuries sustained in the run. Medics are all over the place, and roads are closed off to allow ambulances routes without obstacles.



PLANNING TO RUN? HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Do you have guides that run with me? Can I hire someone?

We get asked this a lot, and the answer is an easy “no.” The bull run is incredibly unpredictable and dangerous enough, you need to be focusing on what is around you instead of trying to mimic someone else’s movements. Each package does come with a walking tour of the course, which will help give you a better understanding of the run before you participate.

Where do I sign up to Run with the Bulls?

There’s no need to sign-up. It’s simply a matter of walking inside the fencing about an hour before the running of the bulls starts (before the fencing is closed) and waiting for the rocket to go off (which signifies they’ve let the bulls out). In the morning, we get you where you need to be in order to participate.

What is the goal of the Running with the Bulls?

It depends on what you want to tell your friends, but we think the ultimate goal should be simply completing the run by ending up in the Plaza de Toros. If you want to get into the arena, don’t fall too far behind the bulls, as they will close the gates shortly after the bulls have entered. You don’t need to actually participate in the arena action: once in the ring you are free to climb the wall and watch from the safety of the spectator areas. However, don’t run too close behind the bull, you don’t want to risk it turning around and causing more trouble.

How many bulls run?

In total you will see 12 animals. There are 6 bulls which can be recognized immediately by their darker coloring, either black or brown. At a closer look you can also tell them apart because they are not castrated. The other 6 bulls are actually steers, recognizable by their lighter coloring, usually white and brown spots. The purpose of the steers is to keep the whole pack together and to calm down the bulls. The steers run every day and know the course well. Steers are harmless, which means they will not try to gore you. If you stand in their way however, they may bump into you.

How many times do they do the Running of the Bulls?

There are 8 runs, beginning July 7th. Each run begins at 8 AM.

How long is the Running of the Bulls?

The run itself is 826 meters, and can last anywhere from 2-6 minutes, depending on the fluidity of the run. The run usually lasts between three and four minutes although it has sometimes taken over ten minutes, especially if one of the bulls has been isolated from his companions.



PLANNING TO RUN? HERE'S WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

Is there an age restriction to run with the bulls?

Yes, you have to be at least 18 years old. On the other side of the spectrum, the local police staff will be perusing the participants before the run to remove those they deem unfit, both physically, and well, their state of intoxication.

Can I run with a camera?

We would strongly advise against it. There is a major problem with people trying to film the run from the street that is causing very avoidable injuries. The local police has begun putting photos of people caught using cameras in the paper hoping for identification. One man from Britain was fined £10,000 in 2018 for attempting a selfie during the run.

If I fall down during the run, what should I do?

Simply stay down and ball up. While this won't ensure complete safety, it is the recommended reaction to increase safety from runners and toros alike.

Can I wear a mounted Go-Pro?

No, the police will kick you out and not let you back in to participate if you are caught with a GoPro, even if it's being held.

Can I wear a mounted Go-Pro?

We get this question more than any other. There are a few professionals who take thousands of photos each morning and sell them. Odds are they catch you in the streets.

Can I watch the Bull Run (encierro) from the bullfight arena (Plaza de Toros)?

Yes, it is possible to watch the runners and bulls enter the arena from the Bull Run. Just walk to the bullfight arena early in the morning to gather a seat before the Bull Run (encierro) at 8 a.m.. After a balcony spot, this is the second best option for watching running of the bulls.

What happens if a bull gets loose?

A large number of pastores (bull "shepherds") cover the entire bull run. They place themselves behind the bulls, with their only protection being a long stick. Their main role is to stop the irritants from inciting the bulls from behind, to avoid the bulls turning round and running backwards, and to help any bulls that have stopped or have been separated from their companions to continue running towards the bullring.

Can I film the run with a drone?

No, and there is an enforced "no fly zone" for drone GPS.

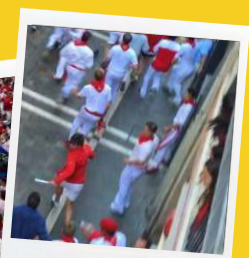

HEMINGWAY

and Pamplona

Where does Hemingway fit in with the San Fermin?

Ubiquitous. That's the best word to describe the man.

All it takes is a 10 minute walk around Pamplona, and you will likely find yourself face to face with Ernest Hemingway in one form or another.

Wander around the famed Plaza de Toros, and there is his massive head, sporting his customary beard and looking so very stoic, as if this was once his property. As you begin to cross the street to head down the famous Estafeta Street, you are connected by Paseo de Hemingway. About 100 steps later you find yourself looking at a giant mural of the man above a store named "Hemingway's."

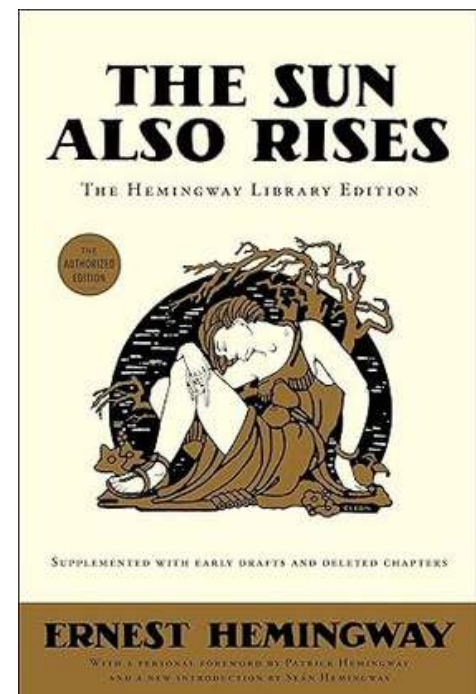
Think we're going overboard with the tributes? Then I would advise you not wander to the neighboring Plaza del Castillo, which features another statue of the great American author. Next to the Hotel La Perla, Hemingway's favorite hotel that has preserved the room he once frequented over 80 years ago.

You get the point by now. You would think he was the mayor or President or the man who saved the city from a hostile takeover, but no. In this case, the pen is much mightier than the sword, and we're not talking about matadors here.

Ernest Hemingway is remembered for many things, but it's his expansive travels and the books they birthed that may be his lasting legacy. These travels served as the inspiration for many of his writings, which included forays to Cuba, Kenya, and many parts of France. But it is his connection with Spain – most notably the San Fermin Festival of Pamplona – that may be the most well known in the often complicated life of Ernest. Furthermore, when you consider the chronological timeline of his publications – despite being a man who was married four times – it can be argued that Pamplona was Hemingway's first true love.

Needless to say, Pamplona loves him back.

While the city's population has grown to a respectable modern day size of nearly 200,000 people, Pamplona still has the feel of a small town. However, today's small town feel pales in comparison to the sleepy Spanish town that Hemingway first found after World War One.



HEMINGWAY

and Pamplona



Long before Twitter, Facebook, or even cell phones, society learned of the world from either word of mouth, newspapers or books. Sanfermines, which features the Running of the Bulls, had always been a local treasure just waiting for its story to be told, and that's exactly what Hemingway did. Between 1923 and 1927, he ventured each July to the Northeast corner of Spain to take in the San Fermin festival.



As Hemingway sipped on a glass of sangria in 1923, Pamplona was probably not on any map published in the US. It likely would have stayed that way if he had not penned *The Sun Also Rises* during the Summer of 1925. But he did, and San Fermin went from what had been a provincial party into an international phenomenon. He would attend the festival nine times in his lifetime, but sadly his view of the celebration changed over time.



During his final visit in 1959, Hemingway found a much different Spain than in the roaring 20s. Gone was the vivacious core of the festival, instead replaced by fascist rule of General Franco. In fact, Hemingway's books weren't even allowed to be read under this government. This was not the city he had fallen in love with. Shortly before his death, he would seemingly come to regret exposing the well kept secret of the festival, citing that, "Pamplona was rough, as always, overcrowded... I've written Pamplona once, and for keeps. It is all there, as it always was, except forty thousand tourists have been added. There were not twenty tourists when I first went there...four decades ago."

Ouch. That is what the kids would call, "selling out." But while Hemingway essentially broke up with Pamplona, we've looked at all of the details and think he should reconsider. There is still chemistry between the two!



Walk around any part of Old Town Pamplona, and you can relive the words on the pages. Like Jake Barnes, you can still sip your morning coffee at Café Iruna, "sitting in the comfortable wicker chairs." Café Iruna itself looks like it is from a time machine, and carries the same local authenticity as it did in the novel. While sitting in that wicker chair, you can gaze out onto the Plaza del Castillo, where the characters nurse their morning coffee and spill their evening wine. You'll also see Bar Torino, better known as Bar Milano in the novel. The landmarks go on and on, just like the legacy of Hemingway in Pamplona.

It is certainly disheartening to read that Hemingway's love affair with San Fermin eventually came to an end, but do not let that dissuade you from experiencing the festival like his characters once did – because that authenticity is still present in Pamplona.

The magic of *The Sun Also Rises* still exists in Pamplona. Let us show you where to find it.

Hotel Tres Reyes

Set in Taconera Park gardens, this modern hotel is in an ideal location for the San Fermin. Towering over the edge of Pamplona's old town, the Tres Reyes boasts luxury amenities from top to bottom. CHOOSING THE RIGHT PACKAGE



While the festival is scheduled from July 6 - 14 each year, every day is a little bit different, which means there are some days that might fit your idea of a vacation more than others. It is our goal to find the best fit personality wise to ensure an experience that meets and exceeds expectations.

What's the biggest difference throughout the week?

We would say that with the exception of July 6th, just about every day of the festival is the exact same. There is a bull run in the morning, a bull fight at night, a firework show, and a concert in the Plaza del Castillo. So what makes July 6th different? It's the biggest party you've ever seen.

I've heard the Opening Ceremonies is the best time to come. What do you think?

Depending on what you like, it's either the best time to come or the absolute worst time to come. The narrow streets of old town are filled to the brim with revelers, singing, marching bands, and non-stop drinking, which is what some people are looking for in Pamplona. On the flip side, there is little room to walk or breathe in the streets, so if you are one who does not do well in large crowds, we do not advise coming these dates. It tends to be a younger and more aggressive crowd from July 5-7.

Do we have to participate in the Running of the Bulls?

Of course not, but each booking affords the option to participate. It does not affect pricing whether you do or not.

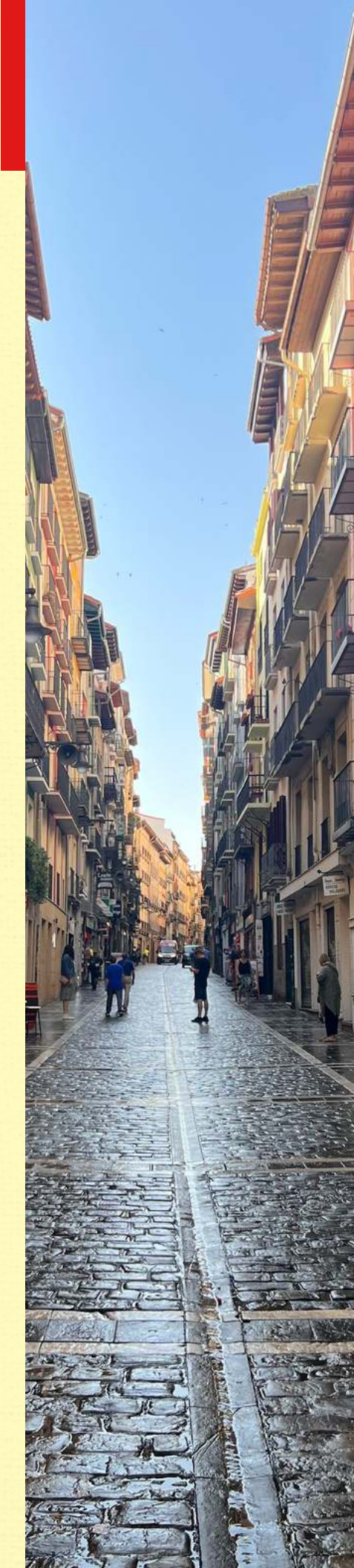
Do your package features vary by date?

Yes, but not by much.. The biggest differences are the opening and closing ceremonies. Besides those dates (July 6 and July 14), every day of the San Fermin is similar from start to finish.

GETTING TO PAMPLONA

Planes, Trains, and Automobiles



BY TRAIN

By our calculations, in the Summer of 2023 close to 90% of our guests either arrived in or left Pamplona via train. They are fast, inexpensive and usually very reliable and the Pamplona train station is just one mile from our San Fermin hotel.

The national train of Spain is named Renfe, and they have a series of trains that frequent Pamplona, especially during the San Fermin.

You are able to book your tickets 60 days out on one of these two websites:

Rail Europe is based in the US and usually has a little higher rate than buying directly from Renfe. However, we would not be doing our job if we didn't share that the Renfe website is notoriously full of errors and confusing translations. It might be worth the extra pennies for the peace of mind to book with the domestic company.

There are direct shuttles from the Madrid and Barcelona Airports to the main train stations.



BY PLANE

This is sometimes not considered because many people do not realize that Pamplona does, in fact, have an airport, its code being PNA. It may have only a few gates, but there are daily flights from both Madrid and Barcelona. Pamplona Airport.

The good part about this is the flights are competitive with the trains in terms of pricing. The bad news, the majority of the flights are in the afternoon or later. Considering that most of the flights coming from the US land early in the morning, you can expect a layover in either Madrid or Barcelona. If you just keep moving, you can sometimes arrive in Pamplona faster via train or bus. Iberia is the most prevalent airline in Spain.



BY BUS / CAR

Buses will typically be the most competitive option.

Since public transportation is so prevalent throughout Europe, you can expect a clean and safe bus to get you to Pamplona. Also, the bus station is only 3 blocks from the hotel in Pamplona.

If renting a car...

Be sure to remember that manual transmission is the norm in Spain, so if you do not know how to drive a stick shift, be sure to rent an automatic car. Rental car companies rarely have automatic cars readily available in their lots, so this isn't always an easy fix in case you accidentally rent a manual transmission.

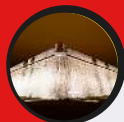
